In Gaelic, the Chief of Clan Campbell is known as "MacCailein Mor," meaning "Son of Colin the Great:" Gailein (Colin) was the first Campbell knight. From this "Great Colin" all hereditary Campbell chiefs derive their title. (pronunciation: Maa hai len MOR)

War Cry

CRUACHAN! (pronunciation: CROO a HAN)

From the imposing mountain. Cruachan Ben, that dominates the northern end of Loch Awe, where the Campbell Castle stood during the time of Cailen Mor in the 13th century.

Clan March

"The Campbells are Coming!"

Also known under a variety of names including, in the Gaelic, "Baile Ionaraora" (The Town of Inveraray).

Tartan

There are four patterns of tartan authorized by MacCailein Mor, Campbells of Breadalbane, Cawdor and Loudon may wear their respective tartans, but all Campbells may wear the plain blue, green and black Campbell sett, often sold in its lighter form as "Ancient Campbell" or "Ancient Black Watch."

Origin of the Name

There are various theories. Usually accepted now is that it comes from the Gaelic "Cambeul" meaning "crooked mouth", and could derive from a physical characteristic of an ancient chief.
